Probably the most important change made was that which manifestly caters to the women voters of the State. Under the plan adopted, chairman and vice chairman of the precinct committee shall be a man and a woman, and the secretarytreasurer of the committee may be either. This plan is followed in he county committee, in which the chairman and vice chairman hall be a man and a woman. This will also he followed in the eight congressional districts in which the congressional committees shall have a man and woman chairman and vice chairman.

Following out the plan, the State central committee shall be compased of 170 members, half the number being women and half being men. There shall be 85 members rom the counties and 16 members from the eight congressional dis-
