of negroes fled the town following the railroad tracks, and dozens of them employed in various businesses down town were dragged out and placed under guard with the others. All business stopped Wednesday and every white man was deputized to help the situation. The crowd of prisoners became so large that detention camps had to be arranged. and some 6,000 negroes were assembled at these places by Wednesday noon. Probably the heaviest fighting took

place at Davis Hill, in the outskirts of the city where a large band of negroes had entrenched themselves. Machine guns were procured and after severe fighting the negroes were routed and fied their position.

A court martial will probably determine the guilt of the prisoners. During the night and early morning airplanes carrying nitro glycer. ine bombs circled over the negro quarters and although they dropped no explosives, brought terror to the negroes whose shricks could be heard above the other noises. The report gained circulation Wednesday that 1,000 heavily armed Muskogee negroes had left for Tulsa to take part in the affair. Guards were placed at every road leading out of Muskogee, and although hands of excited Muskogee negroes gathered together, no effort was made in that direction.
