The board decided that after Janu-ary, 1922, attendance at neither type of institute would constitute eligibility for the renewal of normal training teachers' certificates, but that the holders of these certificates, which require renewal every two years, must have the equivalent of eight hours' work in an accredited normal training school, college or university. Miss Lorraine E. Wooster, state su-perintendent of public instruction, is credited with having issued an order to the effect that only attendance at d with having issued an order effect that only attendance at -week institutes would be grounds for the renewal of the certificates. In view of the fact that only about 25 per cent of the counties of the state hold the four-week institutes, five members of the board of education met recently, and announced that at-tendance at either institute, the four-week or the five-day, would be suf-ficient. This left the county superin-tendents much in doubt. Under the ruling decided upon at the meeting of the board Wednesday the county institute has no bearing or the renewal of the certificates.
